What does synthesis mean?

• c : "the combining of often diverse conceptions into a coherent whole"

Mirriam-Webster On-line Dictionary

- The work of synthesis occurs little by little.
- After this session the work of synthesis is still to be done – by you.

Social glue: What holds people together in a family or a state?

- King Lear: The bonds that hold together king and subject, parent and child depend on an understanding of reciprocal benefits, duties, and obligations.
- Two Treatises of Government: Locke uses a vocabulary of "law" and "compact" to explain how people live together in civil society.

Social glue, cont.

- What sort of "social glue" held Filipina/o immigrants together in the 20s and 30s?
- "Fictive" families & "a culture founded on reciprocity" (Prof. Fujita-Rony, p. 132)
 - We might say that the Filipina/o community replicated traditional social relations but did so in a larger social structure shaped by compact or contract.

Association/Dissociation

- In *Lear*, we see a complex, traditional form of association that fuses family and state.
- In Locke, we see an explanation of the association called state (Locke assumes the existence of the family).
- In Freud, we see the struggle not only between small associations (family) and the wider association called civilization, but also the conflict between the individual and the associations he/she forms.
- In the laws regarding marriage in California in 1933, we see a powerful desire for dissociation. A multi-cultural world tests the boundaries of previous thinking about family and state.

The meaning of <u>human</u> & liminal figures (those who occupy the "border between")

- Victor
- Kaspar Hauser
- Can Filipina/o immigrants be said to be liminal figures?
 - (Consider their status as US "nationals"; consider "Salvador Roldan vs Los Angeles County et al.)
- Liminal figures tell us as much about the known side of the border as the unknown (perhaps more)
- Are these borders comparable?

The costs of association

- <u>Locke</u>: giving up liberty of the state of nature to gain the security of civil society
- The wild child: giving up the precarious liberty of nature to accept the doubtful benefits of civilization
- <u>Freud</u>: gaining the benefits of civilization at the cost of neuroses
- US colonial power and immigrants: Attempted destruction of nationalist association in Philippines; social and legal exclusion in US; eventual challenge by immigrants to fundamental assumptions about the nature of association in US
