Study Questions for Coming Home

Note: The first time you watch a film, you watch it for the story. On the second and third viewings, you start to notice technique—the ways in which the story is being constructed.

- 1. What does it mean to be a Marine in *Coming Home*? How is that different from the ways in which Kubrick presents what it means to be a Marine in *Full Metal Jacket*?
- 2. With whom are your sympathies throughout the film?
- 3. Why do so many scenes have televisions in them?
- 4. What do you notice about the position and movement of the camera in the film relative to the action it is recording? Why, for example, are there so many close-ups?
- 5. Note the use of silence in the film. Where does it appear and why?
- 6. Identify a scene with a song in the soundtrack. What function does the song serve?
- 7. How does the director show a character's interiority?
- 8. Which characters change in the film?
- 9. When Sally Hyde meets her husband for a few days of "R&R" (rest and relaxation) she asks him to talk about the war and asks him what it's like. He responds, "I don't know what it's like. I only know what it is. A TV show is what it's like?" How do you interpret this scene?
- 10. Jane Fonda, the actress who played the part of Sally Hyde, protested the Vietnam War but also described herself as a patriot. Is *Coming Home* an anti-war film? A sympathetic portrait of those who served and sacrificed?
